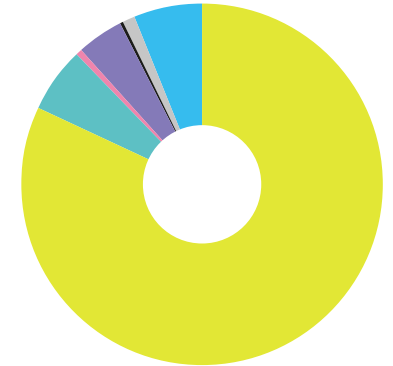

Kantor Centre

Officially opened in September 2019, the **Kantor Centre** has been built to serve as the sporting heart of UCS at our playing fields – a centre which fosters fun, hard work, training, community, teamwork and healthy competition. During their formative years, it is important for young people to appreciate the value of such attributes. They learn that, if you want something, you must put the time and effort in to achieve it. They learn that, no matter how much you prepare, you still might not get what you want. Through sporting endeavours our pupils will learn to understand the importance of hard work and success, but also how to handle disappointment. Such lessons are invaluable and help set UCS pupils up to succeed in life.



Sixth Form Centre

With the introduction of girls into the Sixth Form in 2008, the need for more and better space has grown. In July 2020, we will begin redeveloping the **Sixth Form Centre**, creating a modern and open space to encourage collaborative learning, as well as more focused individual study. The Sixth Form Centre has been conceptualised with the help of current students, who wanted to incorporate sustainability as the central theme of the design. The space will feature greenery, use recycled cork flooring and has made use of existing roof space, which will be covered and converted into a cafe.
